Pets

To help pet owners prepare for the unexpected, the Humane Society has a comprehensive kit, "Providing for Your Pet's Future Without You." The kit includes forms and sample language to help design a will and other estate plans to provide financially for your pet, as well as outlining possibilities for future care. Whatever decisions you make, be sure to review them periodically and make necessary changes. Over time, people's circumstances can change and businesses can close. Remember that in the confusion that accompanies a person's unexpected illness, accident, or death, pets may be overlooked. In some cases, pets are discovered in the person's home days after the tragedy. To prevent this from happening, the Humane Society offers the following suggestions:

Find at least two responsible friends or relatives who agree to serve as temporary emergency caregivers in the event that something unexpected happens to you. Provide them with keys to your home; feeding and care instructions; the name of your veterinarian; and information about the provisions you have made for your pet. Make sure your neighbors, friends, and relatives know how many pets you have and the names and numbers of those who have agreed to serve as emergency caregivers. Carry a wallet "alert card" that lists the names and phone numbers of your emergency pet caregivers and post signs inside your front and back doors with the same information.
